Employee giving campaign tops \$130,000 for record-high giving

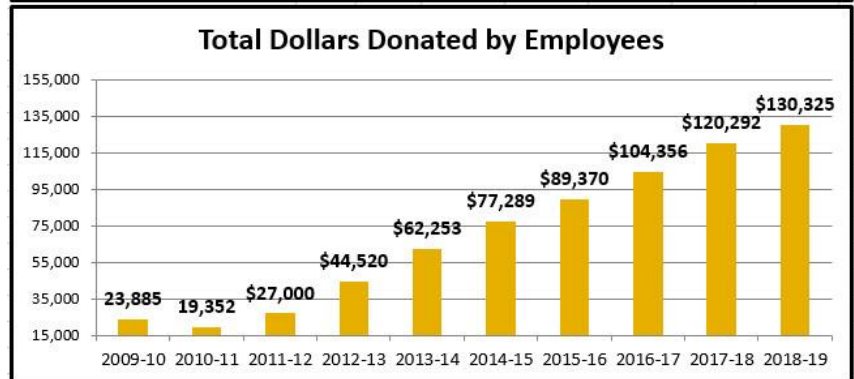
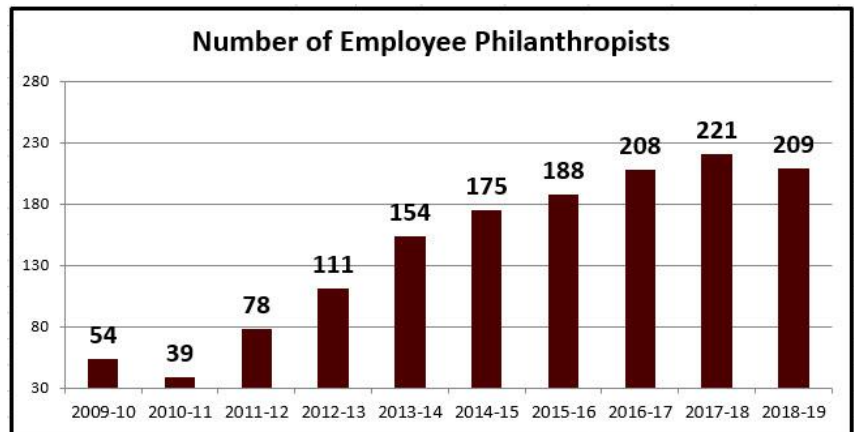
Thank you to all the Hartnell employees who contributed to a very successful Student Success Campaign. I am humbled by the generosity of our campus community and speak about it at every opportunity.

This year's campaign exceeded our \$125,000 goal, with \$131,825 in total contributions by 209 new and contributing donors to support our students, with either a monthly pledge or a one-time donation. In the past nine years, we have raised \$700,142, beginning with \$23,885 contributed by 45 employees in 2009-10.

Your support has a direct impact on our students through scholarships, student emergency funds and areas of greatest need. These funds encourage students to push through and realize their educational dreams.

Hartnell to hold second annual forum for HSI partners on June 14

Hartnell will host its second annual Hispanic Serving Institutions Forum on June 14 and welcome as special guests U.S. Rep. Jimmy Panetta, Dr. David Ortiz, senior vice president and chief operative officer for the Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities, and Luis Maldonado, that same organization's chief advocacy officer.

The morning program in Steinbeck Hall on the Main Campus will focus on efforts to secure and maintain federal support for colleges and universities that qualify as Hispanic-serving, meaning that at least 25 percent of their full-time students are Hispanic/Latinx and at least 50 percent are from low-income households. Another area of emphasis will be a proposal to extend the Hispanic-serving designation to qualifying K-12 school districts, including many in the Hartnell Community College District.

In addition to Hartnell, five other colleges and universities from the Central Coast region will participate in the forum: Gavilan, Cabrillo and Monterey Peninsula colleges; University of California, Santa Cruz; and California State University, Monterey Bay.



'Little Women' musical opens June 22 at The Western Stage

The Western Stage will present "Little Women," the first Mainstage musical of its 2019 season from June 22 through July 13. Based on Louisa May Alcott's beloved semi-autobiographical novel, the heartwarming drama follows the four March sisters as they struggle to find their own paths during the Civil War, mirroring the growing pains of a changing America.

The play starts with Jo, living as a writer in New York, and traces her memory as she looks back on her final four years in Concord, Mass.

Interspersed amid vignettes of Jo's and her sisters' lives, are melodramatic re-enactments of Jo's imaginative tales of adventure and lore.



“Little Women” is directed and choreographed by Lorenzo Aragon, with music direction by Don Dally. Friday and Saturday performances are at 7:30 p.m., and Sunday matinees start at 2 p.m. They are presented in the Mainstage Theater in the Center for Performing Arts (Building K).

Tickets are \$26 general admission, \$24 for seniors and military, and \$12 for children age 5-15. Hartnell students are free with student I.D. Tickets are available at The Western Stage box office, open 5-8 p.m. Tues. through Sat.; online at westernstage.com or by calling (831) 755-6816.

Kenneth Laird, director of public safety and emergency management, invites the greater Hartnell community to consider several key injury-prevention reminders during [National Safety Month](#) throughout June.

This week’s focus is on the risks of fatigue and being under the influence of drugs at work. Adults need 7-9 hours of sleep a day

for peak performance, and excess fatigue decreases safety performance and increases the risk of vehicle accidents. Drug use on the job can lead to lost time, job turnover and increased health care costs.

“Continuous working for 16 hours leaves you not safe to drive,” Laird said. “You’re in the same condition as if you’ve had four drinks and get in the car.”

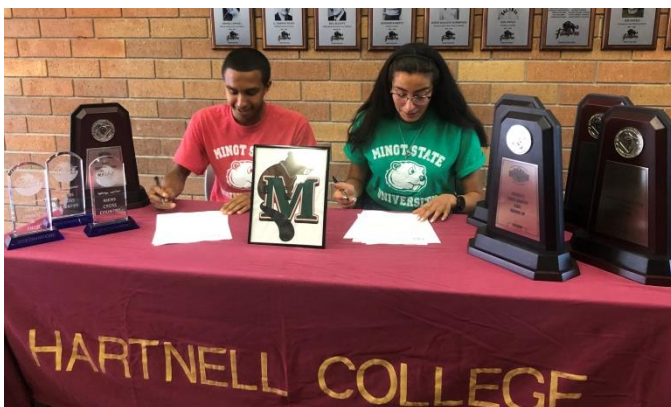
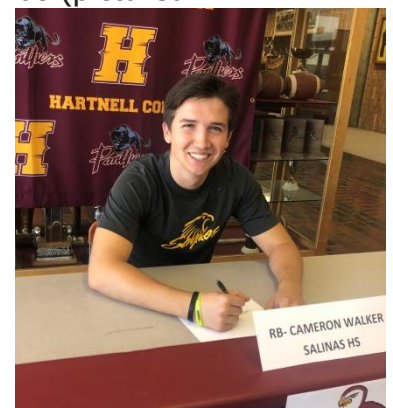
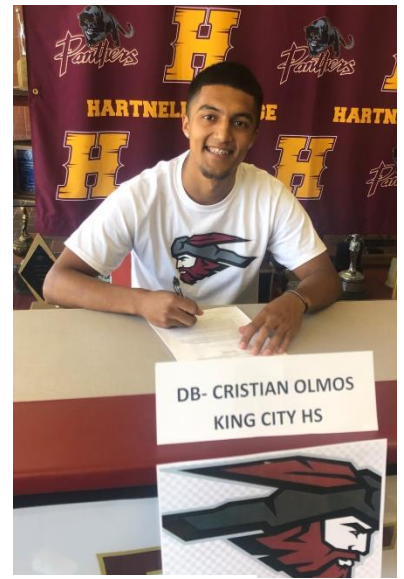
Football, XC and track teams send five to four-year spots

In football, defensive back Christian Olmos (pictured at right in white T-shirt), a graduate of King City High School, is transferring to Western Colorado University in Gunnison, and running back/wide receiver Cameron Walker (pictured lower right in black T-shirt), a graduate of Salinas High School, will continue at Friends University in Wichita, Kan.

In track and field and cross country, Everett Alvarez High School graduate Nick Merrillana and North Salinas High School graduate Nina Arias (pictured together, lower left) are both transferring to Minot State University in Minot, N.D. Javelin and pole vault competitor Jack Fling (pictured lower right in white shirt and hat), who attended Palma High School, will continue as a walk-on at Oklahoma State University in Stillwater.

With words that apply to all five of the transferring athletes, Head Football Coach Matt Collins said, “The recruiting process is always difficult, but I am proud of these guys and that they have an opportunity to go out and experience this world and new things, cultures and ways of life.
