UCSF professor presents module to Hartnell nursing students

On Nov. 4, Dr. Laura Wagner, associate professor in the Department of Community Health Systems at the University of California and researcher for the FG2C, conducted her second monthly session with Hartnell nursing students.

Nursing students listened attentively as Dr. Wagner spoke about time management. They watched a 30minute module on the importance of time management for nurses and then discussed strategies they plan to adopt.

Monthly presentations include academic and career development online modules, in-person mentoring and peer-to-peer interactive sessions aimed at

improving the academic experience and outcomes of FG2C nursing students.

Hartnell, UCSF and California State University, East Bay students and faculty are piloting the FG2C learning modules. Hartnell student and faculty discussions about the innovative FG2C study have been valuable and insightful, said Dr. Debra Kaczmar, dean of academic affairs, nursing and allied health.

Students must be a California resident, enrolled as a full-time student 12 units or more (DSPS student can be enrolled in six units) and have completed a FAFSA application for 2019-20 or CA College Promise Grant. Basketball seasons are underway as soccer, volleyball, football and XC seek to finish strong

Football: After a 38-28 loss to cross-county rival Monterey Peninsula on Nov. 2 at Rabobank Stadium, the Panthers will seek to finish their season with two more wins on the road – against Los Medanos on Nov. 9 and against Reedley on Nov. 16. As of Nov. 7, their conference record was 3-2 and their overall record was 5-3.

<u>Men's Soccer</u>: The men's team has stayed hot, with four wins in its past five games and a record of 5-1-1 in conference and 8-4-2 overall. The Panthers will return home following an extended road series to face West Valley on Nov. 12 and then Skyline on Nov. 15 to conclude their regular season. Both games start at 3 p.m.

Women's Soccer: The women's team added a tie with Las Positas to its record on Nov. 1 and a loss at Evergreen Valley on Nov. 5. Following a home game at 3 p.m. on Nov. 8, they will finish their season on the road at West Valley on Nov. 15. As of Nov. 7, the Panthers' record was 5-2-3 in conference and 9-5-6 overall.

Volleyball: The Panthers had a rough week, losing to Ohlone on the road, 3-2, and falling to San Mateo at home on Nov. 6, 3-1. They will host Foothill at 6:30 p.m. on Nov. 8, followed by two more home dates: Nov. 13 against Cabrillo and Nov. 19 against Skyline, also at 6:30 p.m.

Women's and Men's Cross Country: Check the Hartnell Panthers website or watch for next week's report to learn the outcome of these two strong teams' bid for the Northern California Championship on Nov. 8 at their home course at Toro County Park. The CCCAA State Championship is Nov. 23.

Women's Basketball: The Panther women opened their 2019-20 season with two losses at home, on Nov. 2 against San Mateo (75-48) and on Nov. 5 against Marin (70-35). Their next home game will be Nov. 12 against Modesto, starting at 5 p.m, followed by Shasta on Nov. 15 at 2 p.m. and Taft on Nov. 16, also at 2.

<u>Men's Basketball</u>: The men's team kicks off its 2019-20 season with three home games, starting against Merced at 2 p.m. on Nov. 8, followed by San Jose at 2 p.m. on Nov. 9 and Chabot at 6 p.m. on Nov. 12.
