

2023-24 Highlights

- In Fall 2024, the Salinas Valley Promise program admitted its largest cohort of incoming scholars in its history, with a total of 1396 first-time, full-time students being accepted into the program.
- The Student Support Services/TRIO Program celebrated the graduation of fifty-five students in May 2024. The majority of these students successfully transferred to four-year universities within a three-year period.
- The High School Equivalency Program (HEP) at Hartnell College continues to expand and serve seasonal/migrant farm workers throughout the Salinas Valley. High School Equivalency courses are now offered in Greenfield, Gonzales, Hartnell College Alisal Campus and the Family Resource Center at Martin Luther King Jr. Academy in East Salinas. During the 2023-24 academic year, a total of 67 eligible HEP students successfully obtained their High School Equivalency Certificate. 53 graduates successfully transitioned to post-secondary education courses and one student enrolled in vocational education.
- Hartnell's Support of Undergraduate Life (SOUL) Center opened its first ever free student market, El Mercado. Both El Mercado and the SOUL Center act as central hubs for students to access essential services relating to food, stable housing, financial stability, and wellness security. On average, the Office of Basic Needs receives over 11,000 student visits per semester.
