I have also come incredibly far in my healing in the past 3-4 years and feel stronger and healthier than ever. I take Covid very seriously and am still practicing extremely safe measures that include masking and quarantining. My choice to wait to be vaccinated is based on current CDC concerns and I plan on getting the vaccine at the end of the semester. This is only so I don't fall behind on homework if I have

an immune response to the vaccine like a fever or other symptoms. I am on immunosuppressive medication to treat a condition and I fear that I might end up having a bad reaction once receiving the vaccine so in order to avoid trying to catch up at homework I would rather wait.
